Face Masks

Governor Baker is requiring face masks or cloth face coverings in public places where social distancing is not possible. This applies to both indoor and outdoor spaces. Exceptions include children under the age of 2 and those unable to wear a mask or face covering due to a medical condition. You can read more, and watch a video at <u>mass.gov</u>.

Essential Voices left out of Governor's Reopening Board

"Last week, as Governor Baker prudently extended the statewide closure order until May 18th, he also announced the formation of a board to study how the state should pursue reopening. However, as apointed out, the board isn't exactly representative of the community: of the 17 members, five are public officials and 12 are business leaders, including CEOs of clothing companies and technology firms. Several important voices are missing: there are no labor leaders, and no healthcare workers-two voices that seem absolutely critical to represent those whose jobs put them at risk from the pandemic. We'd also add that the board contains no representation from people with disabilities or seniors, the two communities that have represented the large majority of those lost to the pandemic, and who would be most at risk from an acceleration of the virus. If only business leaders are at the table, we'd be concerned that economic concerns, while critical, will not be adequately balanced by the need to protect human life. "

Reopening Massachusetts

Massachusetts is currently "closed" to non-essential businesses. As of today, golf courses may reopen with restrictions such as closed clubhouses and no carts. While golf is not essential, it probably can be played safely. However, no carts restricts usage to people who can walk long distances, so reopening this way is discriminatory. Other states mandated one person per cart. Obviously golf is not important but we hate to see the initial steps discriminate against people who rely on the cart.

"It is time to think through all that you may face if you require medical care in a hospital. Know that it is NOT business as usual. You should do everything you can to stay out of a hospital, but if you have no choice, BE PREPARED!Healthcare staff may not or do not hold the same attitudes about your quality of life that you do. In addition, the COVID-19 pandemic has changed the usual standards of practice; "usual" standards are not being followed. This is because hospitals need to help many more people then they usually do. It's up to you and your advocates to be prepared if you must go to a hospital or long-term care facility. Be your own best advocate, do your preparation. "

Vote By Mail

Local elections are in May in most towns in Massachusetts, the state primary is scheduled for September 1 and the general election is November 3. Legislators and advocates are wrestling with concerns about keeping voters safe while allowing easy access to voting. We have updates below. With the State Primary on September 1 and General Election November 3, solutions need to be found right away.

Town Elections

If your town has a local election scheduled in the next few weeks, you should <u>contact your town clerk</u> about the status of that election. A new law has been passed to allow towns to postpone their local elections by a local vote. Some towns with upcoming elections have already obtained court orders to allow them to move their elections.

Whether or not your town has postponed your local election, a law has been passed to allow early voting by mail in local elections being held on or before June 30, 2020. You may <u>apply now for your mail-in early ballot</u>.

If your town's election has been moved, ballots for the original election date will still be valid. If you have already submitted an absentee ballot, that ballot will be counted.

Massachusetts

Legislators, Secretary of State Galvin and Attorney General Healey are all working on mechanisms to implement some form of Vote by Mail for the September primary and the November election. The primary brings added complications because there are different ballots for Democrats and Republicans, and unenrolled voters can request either. Added to that complication is the fact that voters can change their enrollment 20 days before an election, but these ballots and applications may need to be prepared and mailed before that.

Representative Jeffrey Roy (Franklin and Medway) has filed a bill with a proposed vote by mail mechanism for the remainder of 2020. <u>rep</u> <u>santiago and rep roy election bill.pdf</u>

The <u>Lowell Sun</u> reports on Secretary Galvin's proposal and a bill from Representatives John Lawn and Michael Moran which is also supported by Senators Eric Lesser and Adam Hinds.

The most striking difference between the bills being filed in the legislature and Secretary Galvin's proposal is that the bills require mailing either a ballot application (Roy's bill) or an actual ballot (Lawn's bill) before the election, while Galvin proposes to allow voters to apply for a mail in ballot.

None of the bills address a key disability issue which is that people who cannot see or write on a ballot will have to go to the polls to use the Automark machine, putting themselves at increased risk. Everyone supports expanded early voting and open polls on election day which should allow voters to be more socially distanced than we usually are.

Nationwide

Vote By Mail is gaining increased interest by the Senate and Congress. The <u>National Conference of State Legislatures</u> (NCSL) has summarized the situations in each state. 5 states already have vote by mail. Oregon or Colorado may also have electronic voting for people who are overseas. Presumably electronic voting would be useful for people who are visually or physically impaired, and who have screen readers or voice recognition on their home computers. Today, each state is in charge of its own elections.

Health Connector Special Enrollment Expanded

Massachusetts residents losing their jobs and job-based health coverage can get health coverage through the Health Connector. Massachusetts residents can apply for coverage at <u>www.mahealthconnector.org</u>. The ConnectorCare program connects qualifying Massachusetts residents with affordable health coverage with low or \$0 premiums and low co-pays and no deductibles. This special enrollment period will run through May 25.

Housing

Thank you to Independence Associates for additional information on Housing issues.

The state is implementing a temporary moratorium on evictions and foreclosures due to Covid 19. If you are having trouble making rent, talk to your landlord and get everything in writing for proof of conversations later on.

- **RESIDENTIAL TENANTS:** In order to avoid having to pay late fees or receiving a negative credit report, the law requires tenants to send a form of hardship notice to their landlord within 30 days of every missed rent payment. That means if a tenant missed paying rent due April 1, the tenant must send the form by April 30 (3 days from now). One form must be filled out for each month of missed payment. If a tenant is unable to fill out and transmit the form, they can also email or post a letter to the landlord with the same information. - HOMEOWNERS: The Division of Banks has also put out a Frequently Asked Questions document regarding the moratorium on foreclosures. Direct link here: www.mass.gov/doc/chapter-65-dob-fag
- SMALL BUSINESS TENANTS: Similar to residential tenants, small businesses are also not subject to late fees or negative credit bureau reporting if they submit a form of notice to their landlord within 30 days of missed rent payment. Small businesses must submit two forms:
 - A certification of hardship: <u>www.mass.gov/doc/form-of-notice-covid-19-hardship-small-</u> <u>business-tenant</u>

- **LANDLORDS**: The law allows the landlord to use last month's rent to pay for certain expenses including, but not limited to, mortgage payments, utilities, repairs and required upkeep. However the landlord must send a form of notice to the tenant when doing so. The form is here: www.mass.gov/doc/notice-to-tenant-use-of-advance-rent-payment

- You will not be subject to late fees or a negative report to a credit bureau if you certify to your landlord in writing within 30 days from the missed payment that your non-payment of rent is due to a financial impact from COVID-19. If possible, you should use the approved form at: https://www.mass.gov/lists/moratorium-onevictions-and-foreclosures-forms-and-other-resources. If you cannot access the form on this website, you can ask your landlord to provide the form to you. You may also send a letter or email so long as it contains a detailed explanation of your household loss in income or increase in expenses due to COVID-19.

"On April 1, 2019 elected officials, nonprofit workers, and the public gathered at Nevins Hall in Framingham to kick off the state's 2020 census. This event marked the one-year countdown to the National Census Day (April 1, 2020).

The census is mandated by our Constitution and aims to include every person living in the United States. Census data provides the basis for distributing more than \$675 billion in federal funds every year to support states, counties and community programs, such as housing, education, transportation, employment, and h#ealth care.

During the #2020Census, households will be able to self-respond in three ways: Internet, Telephone or Paper Questionnaire. The Census Bureau has indicated that the online questionnaire and telephone contact centers will all be fully accessible to people with disabilities and that the paper questionnaire will be available to download in both braille and large print. Completing the #2020Census form ensures that neighborhood schools, health centers, and other vital parts of our communities are adequately funded.
