- October 1, 2013: One Care start date, self-selection enrollments only
- November 1, 2013: 60-day notice sent to first auto-assignment (passive/automatic enrollment) group
- January 1, 2014: Services start for first auto-assignment group
- 2nd wave of auto-assignment effective tentatively April 1, 2014
- Possible 3rd wave of auto-assignment tentatively July 1, 2014

Meanwhile, 2 of the original 6 Integrated Care Organizations (now called One Care Plans) have dropped out of the Demonstration/One Care because the payment rates are too low. More may drop out before contracts are signed in July. We do not know how this will affect the program as a whole.

The coming weeks may determine the success of this new healthcare system for 110,000 Massachusetts residents with disabilities. Now, while so much is changing, is a crucial time to make our voices heard. Please attend on June 19th, and spread the word to your networks.

Disability, Social Security, and the missing context

A recent NPR piece on *Planet Money/This American Life*, titled "Unfit for

Work-the startling rise of disability in America" (by Chana Joffe-Walt) implied that the Social Security Disability program has become the new welfare system, and that it is being exploited by out of work people. Trudy Lieberman, in the [Columbia Journalism Review](#), has uncovered serious issues with the NPR report and slams it as "an unfortunate example of incomplete reporting".

Missing from Ms. Joffe-Walt's NPR piece is

- Qualifying for Social Security Disability benefits is difficult.
- In 2010, out of the 29.5 million adult Americans who reported having a disability, only 8.8 million received disability benefits at the beginning of the year.
- The NPR report used Hale County, Alabama which is one of the poorest counties in the U.S., and is not representative of an average county. "...the country has an older, less-educated workforce, and an economy based on forestry, mining, and manufacturing, which tend to spawn more work-related disabilities than service industries."

The push back has been significant and from unexpected sources. "In an [open letter](#), eight former Social Security commissioners said "Unfit for Work" failed to tell the whole story and perpetuated dangerous myths about the Social Security disability programs and the people helped by this vital system." In their letter, they acknowledged that disability claims had risen significantly, but noted that growth had been predicted as early as 1994-the result of more women in the workforce and baby boomers reaching the years when disability sets in."

Trudy Lieberman concludes: "After rereading "Unfit for Work," I agree with the critics. The piece did a disservice to an important safety net crucial to the survival of some of the sickest people around. It could have been a useful service had it explained what disability benefits are -social insurance, not welfare."

We agree! We expect more from NPR.

And here's another article from the June 14 Wall Street Journal, also questioning NPR's conclusions entitled "[Are Long-Term Unemployed Taking Refuge in Disability?](#)" The author, Ben Casselman, examines the data and concludes that fears of increasing fraudulent claims are unfounded.

Ticket to Work

[AARP](#) provides a good overview of this Social Security program "which encourages people with disabilities, ages 18 to 64, to try to return to work and become more financially independent. Ticket to Work arranges free vocational training, rehabilitation, job referrals and employment assistance. Services are provided through private employment networks and state vocational rehabilitation agencies that partner with Social Security". People receiving benefits from SSDI are eligible.

The program offers a 9 month trial working period when benefits will not be reduced.

"The SSI program has no trial work period, but beneficiaries are encouraged to develop a Plan for Achieving Self Support (PASS) and submit it to SSA. Although additional earnings often reduce SSI benefits, an SSA-approved PASS plan can let you set aside income or assets to achieve goals, such as training for a new job or starting a business"
